> **Hands-on Rose Pruning Demonstrations:**

Did you know the time to prune your roses is on Valentine's Day? Are you a bit hesitant on what types of roses to prune and not prune? Then be sure to visit the Master Gardener Horticulture Demonstration Garden on Thursday, February 11, at 9:00 a.m.

Master Gardener and consulting Rosarian John Jons will provide demonstrations on how to



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properly prune your roses. Please bring hand pruners and gloves (not required but needed if you wish to practice pruning on site). The Master Gardener Horticulture Demonstration is located in Carbide Park at 4102 Main Street in La Marque. Upcoming Seminars

Master Gardeners are sponsoring two educational programs this Saturday that will likely be of interest to gardeners across the county.

I looked up the term "book-learning" and one definition goes as follows: Knowledge acquired from reading books, as opposed to knowledge gained through experience; theoretical or academic knowledge as opposed to practical or commonsense knowledge.

The speakers for both programs have "book-learning" (they have, after all, earned the title of Certified Master Gardeners) and they have amassed a wealth of practical or common-sense knowledge from their lifelong experiences as gardeners. Moreover, they gladly share their knowledge and experiences with the public.

Master Gardener Chris Anastas will provide a PowerPoint presentation "Growing Backyard Citrus" on Saturday, February 6, from 9:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. Chris has sizable home citrus orchard. She will discuss a variety of topics including rootstock and variety selection for citrus; cultural care of trees; common disease and insect pest problems and how to manage them; control of birds and critters; and freeze protection.

Master Gardener Robert Marshall will present a PowerPoint program entitled "Citrus Greening Disease" on Saturday, February 6, 11:00 a.m. - 12 Noon. Citrus greening is a bacterial disease of citrus that was first confirmed in Harris County in 2014. To help reduce the spread of this disease; Harris, Fort Bend and Montgomery counties, in addition to two counties in the Valley, have been quarantined by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Robert has been trained as a first-responder to help identify new occurrences of this disease. His presentation will cover what symptoms to look for and preventative measures home growers can practice to help reduce chances of citrus trees grown in the home landscape becoming infected with citrus greening.

Master Gardener Ira Gervais will present a PowerPoint program entitled "Growing Great Tomatoes in Galveston County" on Saturday, February 6, from 1:00 p.m. - 3:30 p.m. This Saturday's program is part two of a threepart program on Growing Great Tomatoes in Galveston County. Galveston County Master Gardener Ira Gervais will discuss his secrets to successful planting and production of great tomatoes. Program participants will learn about the various varieties that do well in this area, when to transplant tomato seedlings and various growing techniques. Information on soil requirements, needed nutrients and the temperature ranges for best tomato fruit set will be discussed.

All three programs will be conducted at the Galveston County AgriLife Extension Office located in Carbide Park (4102-B Main St.) in La Marque. No fee but pre-registration is required (e-mail: GALV3@wt.net or phone 281-309-5065).
