Welcome to the world of 4-H! 4-H is full of opportunities and we hope that you find 4-H an exciting and continuous journey.

4-H is for kids of almost any age – anyone in grades 3-12 can be a 4-H member, and those in grades K-2 can join as Clover Kids. The 4-H program is built upon community clubs with volunteer Club Managers and Project Leaders. The first step will be finding your club (or clubs, you can join more than one!) We suggest starting with a club that is close to you and reaching out to that club's manager to attend a meeting. Feel free to visit as many clubs as you like before deciding which club(s) you would like to join. Some clubs have specific focus areas, however welcome all members no matter which projects their members choose to pursue. Once you have found your club, you will join online at <u>4-H Online</u>. The 4-H year begins every September. Once you are enrolled, you will receive updates from the 4-H office, your club managers, and through our Galveston County 4-H newsletter, the "Four Leaf Brief."

4-H DICTIONARY

CLOVER KID

Youth in grades K-2. They are able to participate in activities, recognition programs, and competitive events only to receive a "participation" award. Clover Kids are not eligible to serve as club and/or county officers.

CLUB

An organized group of at least five youth who meet monthly with adult volunteers for a long-term, progressive series of educational experiences.

CLUB MANAGER:

Provides guidance in management to a 4-H club. A 4-H club manager involves 4-H officers, parents, leaders, and members in promoting the goals of 4-H and serves as the contact person between the club and the County Extension Office.

CLUB OFFICER

A 4-H member elected by the club each year. They have the responsibility of planning, implementing, and evaluating all club meetings and activities. Working with club managers, they form an executive committee to give overall guidance to the club.

COUNTY COUNCIL

Elected 4-H members who serve in leadership roles at the county-level. They assist with developing and coordinating county projects, events, and bi-monthly county-wide meetings. All 4-H members and parents are invited to these meetings.

COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT:

Responsible for oversight of the 4-H and Youth Development Program in their assigned county.

4-H DICTIONARY

GAME OF CLOVERS:

A year-long competition between clubs. Points are earned by completing tasks as determined by a point system based on enrollment and participation. The winning club receives recognition at the annual awards banquet and a gift from the 4-H Office.

PROJECT:

A eries of hands-on learning activities which help youth reach their goals. Projects vary widely in scope and context.

PROJECT LEADER:

Provides structured learning experiences, personal guidance, and counseling in project-related opportunities for the 4-H members enrolled in the project group.

RECORDBOOK:

An organized book of what you have learned and accomplished in 4-H. It can be submitted for evaluation against other 4-H members.

ROUNDUP

An event for 4-H members to compete in non-livestock contests. Examples include Quiz Bowl, Food Challenge, Vet Science Skill-a-thon, Fashion Show and more! Roundups are offered at the county, district, and state levels.

STAR AWARDS:

Awards given in recognition of deserving youth members and adult volunteers. These awards are the highest county-level achievement awards in the 4-H program.

VALIDATION:

The process of ear tagging, tattooing, and gathering DNA on livestock that will be exhibited at a show. This creates an even-playing field between exhibitors.

Visit Clubs

In Galveston County, we have three types of clubs:

- **Community Clubs**: open to all 4-H members close in proximity; focus on many project areas
- **Project Clubs**: open to all 4-H members; focus on just one particular project area
- **School Clubs**: open to 4-H members who attend the school; focus on many project areas

You are welcome to try out as many clubs as you would like to see which one(s) are the best fit for your family! Joining a club allows you to meet other 4-H'ers who have similar interests and can help you out with your 4-H projects.

Clover Kid: K-2nd Junior: 3rd-5th Intermediate: 6th-8th Senior: 9th-12th

CALENDAR

The 4-H year starts September 1st and goes through August 31st. Enrollment will remain open throughout the year. However, 4-H members must re-enroll each September 1st.

COST

Member participation fees will be \$25.00 for those enrolling between August 15th and October 31st. Beginning November 1st, and for the continuation of the 4-H year, the participation fee will be \$30.00. Clover Kids member fees are \$10.00. Adult volunteer enrollment is \$10.00 per year.

MEETING EXPECTATIONS

4-H members are expected to attend scheduled monthly club meetings. If unable to attend, please let your club manager know.

ACADEMIC ELIGIBILITY - NO PASS NO PLAY

4-H is recognized by the Texas Education Agency and each local school district as an extracurricular activity. All 4-H members participating in any 4-H competitive event must be passing all classes in order to compete, whether or not the competitive event is during school time. Prior to each competitive event, forms are sent to each school to check eligibility for the most recent grade reporting period. If 4-H members are marked ineligible by the school, they will be notified by the Extension Office.

EXCUSED ABSENCES

4-H members participating in an activity which is approved by the local school board, will be reported as an excused absence at the school's discretion. Schools will be notified from the Extension Office as to what members will be participating, as well as dates and times that they are to miss classes.

CLOVER KIDS

Grades K-2 \$10 participation fee

Clover Kids are not eligible to serve as club officers or be entered into activities, recognition programs, or competitive events reserved for older youth. Clover Kids will be presented with participation awards only.



WHAT IS A RECORDBOOK?

The 4-H Recordbook is an organized book of what you have learned and accomplished in 4-H. When accurately kept and carefully assembled, it is a useful tool for determining your own progress and personal growth. The Recordbook documents knowledge, attitudes, and skills that have been learned. They relay a 4-H members experiences in leadership, citizenship, and community.

WHY KEEP A RECORDBOOK?

4-H records help you develop a recordbook, as well as apply for awards, scholarships and college. The Recordbook is the complete history of a member's 4-H activities. Winners in each age division advance to district. Senior 4-H members who place first at district advance to the state recordbook judging.

PROJECT PINS

Project pins are awarded to 4-H members who submit a 4-H Recordbook. Pins are given in the same category of your Recordbook and are given at the Awards Banquet in August. See page 16 for Recordbook categories. 5-year, 8-year, and 10-year member pins are also awarded.

STAR AWARDS

Star Awards are a series of awards showing progression of the 4-H members involvement, including growth and diversification of both the 4-H member and their projects/events. This is achieved by submitting a 4-H Recordbook and application, which will be evaluated by judges and displays members project work and achievement, leadership, personal growth, and development.

Awards include:

- Gold Star senior level, 3 years in 4-H
- Danforth I Dare You senior level, 3 years in 4-H
- Silver Star intermediate level, 3 years in 4-H
- Bronze Star junior level, 2 years in 4-H
- Rookie of the Year first year in 4-H
- Outstanding Adult Leader
- Rookie Adult Leader leader who has served 1-3 years
- **Friend of 4-H** individual, business, or group who has contributed to success of 4-H
- Club Community Service clubs that demonstrate how they have improved lives of Galveston County citizens

GAME OF CLOVERS

Game of Clovers gives 4-H members the opportunity to earn points for their 4-H club to see who can be the ultimate 4-H Club for the year. The winning club receives a club party and their name on a plaque presented at the Awards Banquet.



Good youth development programs do not just happen. It takes a team with the combined effort of parents and volunteers along with the guidance of Extension youth development professionals to establish a good 4-H program which contributes to the ultimate development of our youth. If this team is to be successful, then the parents must be involved.

WHAT CAN PARENTS DO TO SUPPORT AND/OR HELP IN THE 4-H PROGRAM?

- Learn what 4-H is all about (purposes, objective, etc.)
- Exhibit a genuine interest and enthusiasm in 4-H and in your child.
- Encourage participation in 4-H activities. Participation stimulates interest and enthusiasm.
- Assist your child in selecting a project they will enjoy, a project they have the ability to accomplish, and one for which you can help furnish facilities, financing, needed materials, and guidance.
- Provide encouragement. Help in project work with recordkeeping, demonstrations, judging, and completion of attempted work and leadership responsibilities.
- Provide transportation for members to local club meetings, county events, and various activities.
- Attend at least half of the club meetings each year with your child.
- Get informed about "what's going on" and continue to keep informed.
- Provide a meeting place for the project group. When possible, assist leaders and club by providing refreshments or other help.
- Volunteer to be a project leader. All adults have abilities that would greatly assist the 4-H program.
- Serve on a committee to help plan and conduct special club activities and events.
